Welcome to the 13th edition of Lancaster Jazz Festival! As always, this year's festival will feature the brightest talents in contemporary jazz, exciting new artists, and new music from across the UK.

We're building a new collaboration with Tomorrow's Warriors and are featuring two exciting emerging artists from the Warriors Rise tour: Maddy Coombs and Donovan Haffner. Both will be performing at the Duke's Moor Space, which is hosting a series of incredible gigs, finishing with the epic Led Bib on Sunday afternoon.

From Thursday to Sunday, an expansive programme is on offer at the Kanteena. Thursday's Youth Jazz Night celebrates our local young musicians, while Friday night features the brilliant Zulu rhythms of Ubunye, who will be playing their new album. Saturday and Sunday's free programme is eclectic and electric, with fusion, rock, funk, and hip-hop influences, and with Glasgow's Sonedo and Leeds' Plantfood bringing the party vibes on Saturday evening.

Jazz FM's Instrumentalist of the Year, Mark Kavuma, brings his quartet to the beautiful Priory Church on Saturday evening. As a composer, trumpeter and bandleader, his style is epitomised by the colour, texture and harmony of his compositions.

The ever-popular early gigs at The Herbarium bring a progressive contemporary sound, and Thursday's gig with A Hologram Maze is a chance to hear one of the UK's most multi-faceted pianists.

If you want to get involved, join us at our Innovation Hub hosted at The Gregson Centre. Made possible with support from Groundswell Innovation, you can join a jam or a workshop. Drop in, you never know what you might find! Free entry all weekend too!

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Artist in Residence

We're delighted to welcome James Mainwaring as our Artist in Residence at this years festival.

James Mainwaring is a genre-fluid improvising saxophonist and composer. Since cofounding the Mercury Prize-nominated Roller Trio, he has carved a distinctive path through ambitious solo projects and boundary-pushing collaborations.

His playing combines extended techniques—currently focusing on multiphonics, and singing while playing—with a deep commitment to instrumental exploration.

In addition to solo work, Mainwaring leads and co-creates in ensemble contexts. His collaborative focus currently is on two projects: one of which is The Exu, a visceral trio with double bassist Dave Kane and drummer Emil Karlsen. Drawing influence from free jazz, hip hop, and metal. The second is Sveið, a trio with Karlsen and electronic artist Federico Reuben. Their upcoming album Latent Imprints (due in 2025 on New York's 577 Records) explores the creative tension between human expression and machine logic, using generative AI to co-create and disrupt in real time. Entirely improvised and recorded in one session, the album interrogates authorship, agency, and post-digital mythmaking.

Mainwaring continues to contribute to the UK and European improvised music scenes through performance, recording, and education. Based in Leeds, he is a tutor and lecturer at Leeds Conservatoire.

James will be running a workshop and performing a special solo set at the Gregson on Saturday - see the Innovation Hub page for details.

Also look out for James playing with one of his current projects, the Exu, at Kanteena on Sunday.

Featuring two powerful vocalists from South Africa's Kwa Zulu Natal region combined with a dynamic rhythm section and an array of guest artists, Ubunye's music is a unique blend of contemporary jazz, Afro-pop, and traditional 'Isigqui' Zulu music.

Their inspirational fusion of jazz, dance, and afro-beat that encapsulates the soul of South Africa, has won the band a legion of fans across the UK and beyond.

An explosive live act, Ubunye were winners of the best UK jazz ensemble award at the Parliamentary Jazz awards. London based German violinist and singer Johanna Burnheart carves her own niche with a unique mix of modal jazz and electronic works.

Johanna's work exists at the point where modal jazz and techno meet, reflecting her immersion in the Berlin techno & house scene.

Since forming her own band, Johanna has released two albums to great critical acclaim, "Burnheart" and 2023's "Bär", with both gaining significant radio play on BBC Radio 6 and beyond.

She will be presenting her music at the festival in a very special intimate solo setting in the Herbarium.



Rory A. Green

Influenced by artists such as GoGo Penguin and Fabiano do Nascimento Portico Quartet, this project takes the sensitivity and emotional depth of acoustic and ambient music and brings it into a world with infectious rhythms drawn from Rory's West African heritage.

His guitar speaks in multiple dialects weaving West African rhythmic sensibilities with European harmonic frameworks into a sound that's both globally informed and deeply personal.

The Manchester-based composer has become a fixture at prestigious venues across the UK, sharing stages with an impressive roster of boundary-pushing artists, including jazz guitarist Mansur Brown, electronic producer Kessoncoda, and contemporary classical pianist James Heather.

Off The Rails & Elbow Room

Off the Rails Creative Jazz Orchestra and Elbow Room, who exist to provide a supportive space for women playing jazz, join forces to present a set of tunes by female composers.

Both bands have enjoyed workshops, collaborations, and shared a stage with incredible musicians, including Jilly Jarman, Annie Whitehead, Emma Johnson, Emma Rawicz, and Alina Bzhezhinska. They will be playing tunes they've picked up along the way and originals from band members, including Elbow Room's MD Trish Ferrarin.

Archipelago

Archipelago are a genre-defying trio of adventurous musicians, formed out of the north-east of England's creative musical underground.

Their sound is a dreamlike collision of otherworldly atmospheres, heartfelt songwriting, and energetic off-kilter rhythms. They morph between instruments and effects, creating the illusion of a much larger ensemble, before peeling back to their raw, improvisational trio form.

Flo/ra

Flo/ra is a modern instrumental jazz band. The music explores complex feelings on gender, belonging, and neurodivergence, taking inspiration from repetitive chant music.

The project draws on a wide range of musical influences, including modern and spiritual jazz, world and folk music, chamber music, and Drum and bass, to create a unique twist on the conventional jazz quintet sound.

Evening In The Universe

Reflecting the unparalleled multicultural demographic of contemporary London, Evening in the Universe's instrumentation and members draw from a wide range of traditions that would only be possible in this time and this place.

Trance-like, the timbre of performances creates a feeling of tribal movement. It's European jazz in its form and explorative nature, but the entire sound is somewhere closer to the texture of Senegalese percussive musics.

This, combined with modern effects and soundscapes, gives the sound an expansive quality which firmly plants EITU in a neighbourhood of its own.

Benjamin Luhis is a multi-instrumentalist, songwriter, and producer from Nottingham. As an artist he is particularly interested in the sonics of sound: how tone, timbre and duration elicit deeper emotional connections to music and the collective experience.

His music is a blending of worlds and ideas and is an exploration of alt- r&b, jazz, broken beat, and EDM.

The music explores awareness and wellbeing, and what it means to sit within different spaces and understand yourself as a person and as a creative. It is a celebration continuing conversations and musical dialogues with audiences and musicians.

Sonedo is the genre-bending project of half-Japanese, half-Scottish keyboardist and producer Sean Edo Morrison. This powerhouse live band forges a fresh blend of jazz, UK rap, and dance music, with the group weaving a tapestry of jazz improvisation with sharp lyricism and seriously modern grooves.

Taking cues from artists like Ezra Collective, corto.alto, Venna and Knucks, the group delivers a high-energy, collaborative sound that feels both deeply musical and distinctly UK. Winners of the prestigious Peter Whittingham Jazz Development Award from Help Musicians, Sonedo is now gearing up to release their debut album.

Plantfood are a blood-pumping jazz force summoning an onslaught of electronic and acoustic sounds with very broad influences, ranging from heavy hitters like The Prodigy to the spiritual explorations of John Coltrane.

The 6-piece collective traverses a multitude of styles and guides audiences through the extremes of the mosh pit to serene meditations, drawing excitement from their music's "ability to resonate with others no matter the age or background."

This collective came up through and formed within the inspiring Leeds Jazz scene. They have quickly become a defining sound in that city's vibrant and exciting jazz community.
